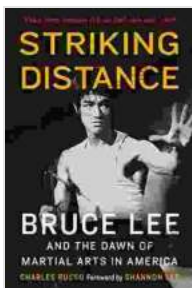


Bruce Lee: The Dawn of Martial Arts in America
