


The Feast in the House of Levi, another iconic painting by Veronese, captures the grandeur and festive atmosphere of a biblical feast.

Religious and Mythological Themes



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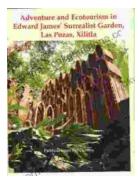
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
