

Etching

> **Etching** is an intaglio printmaking technique that uses a chemical solution called an etchant to create incised lines on a metal plate. When the plate is immersed in the etchant, it reacts with the exposed metal, creating recessed lines.

Engraving

Drypoint

Tips for Drypoint:

- Use a sharp needle: A sharp needle will create clean, crisp lines and minimize tearing of the plate.
- Vary the pressure: Experiment with applying different amounts of pressure to the needle to create lines of varying depth and width.
- Protect the plate: Drypoint plates are more fragile due to the raised burrs, so handle them carefully and avoid over-inking to prevent damage.

Mezzotint

> **Mezzotint** is an intaglio printmaking technique that creates tonal variations by roughening the surface of a metal plate with a mezzotint rocker. This process creates a series of tiny pits, which hold ink and produce a smooth, velvety gradation of tones from light to dark.

Aquatint






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
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
