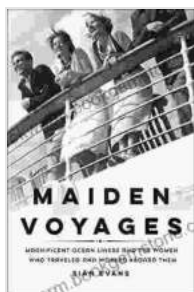

Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service), performing a variety of duties such as communications, intelligence, and aircraft maintenance.

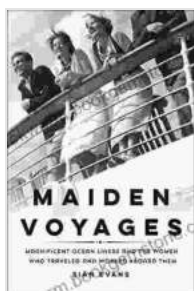

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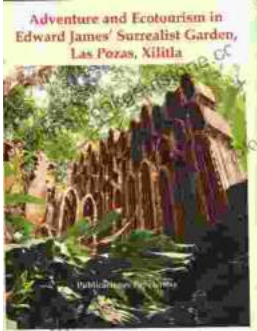
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
