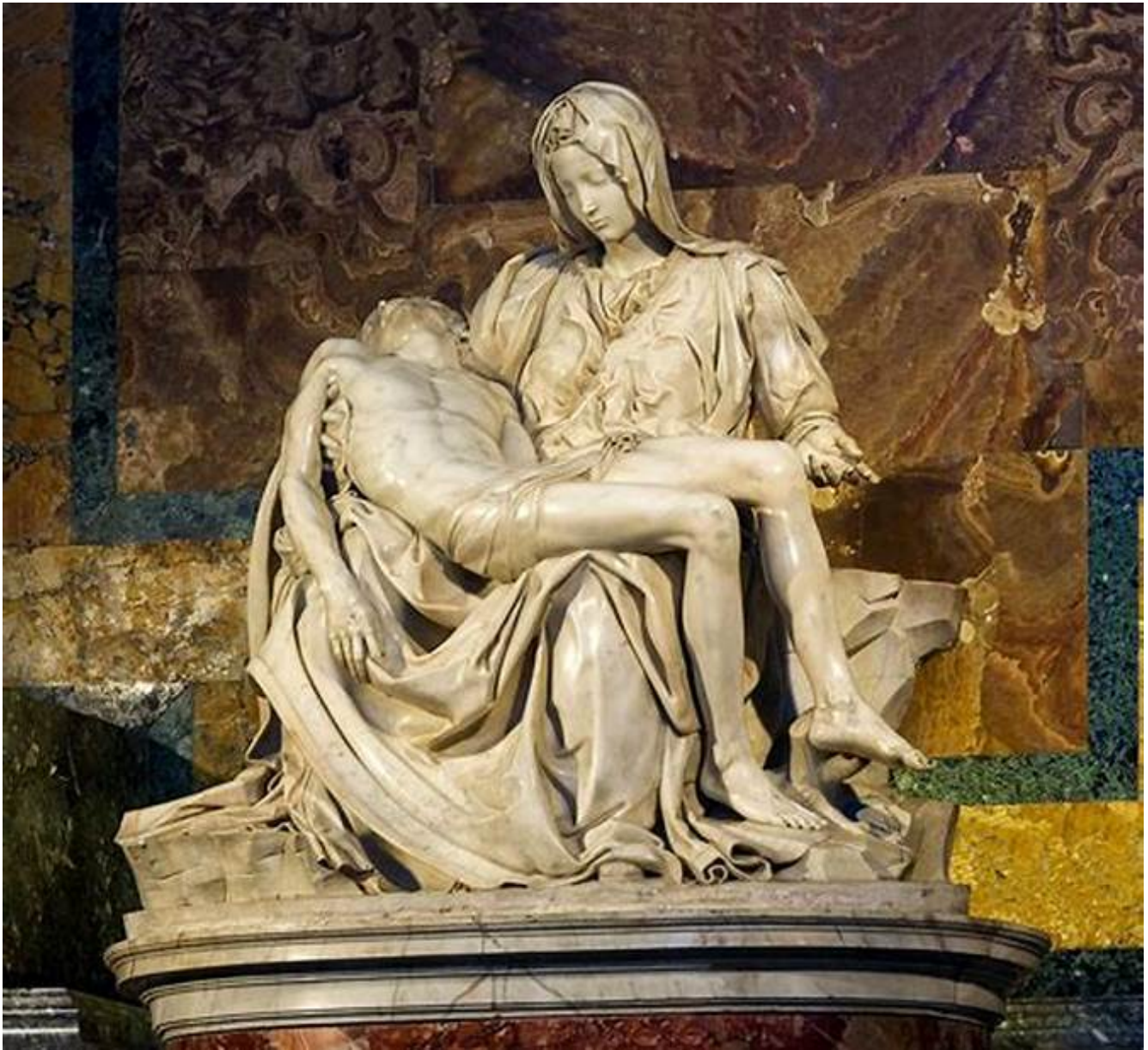


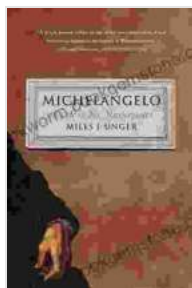

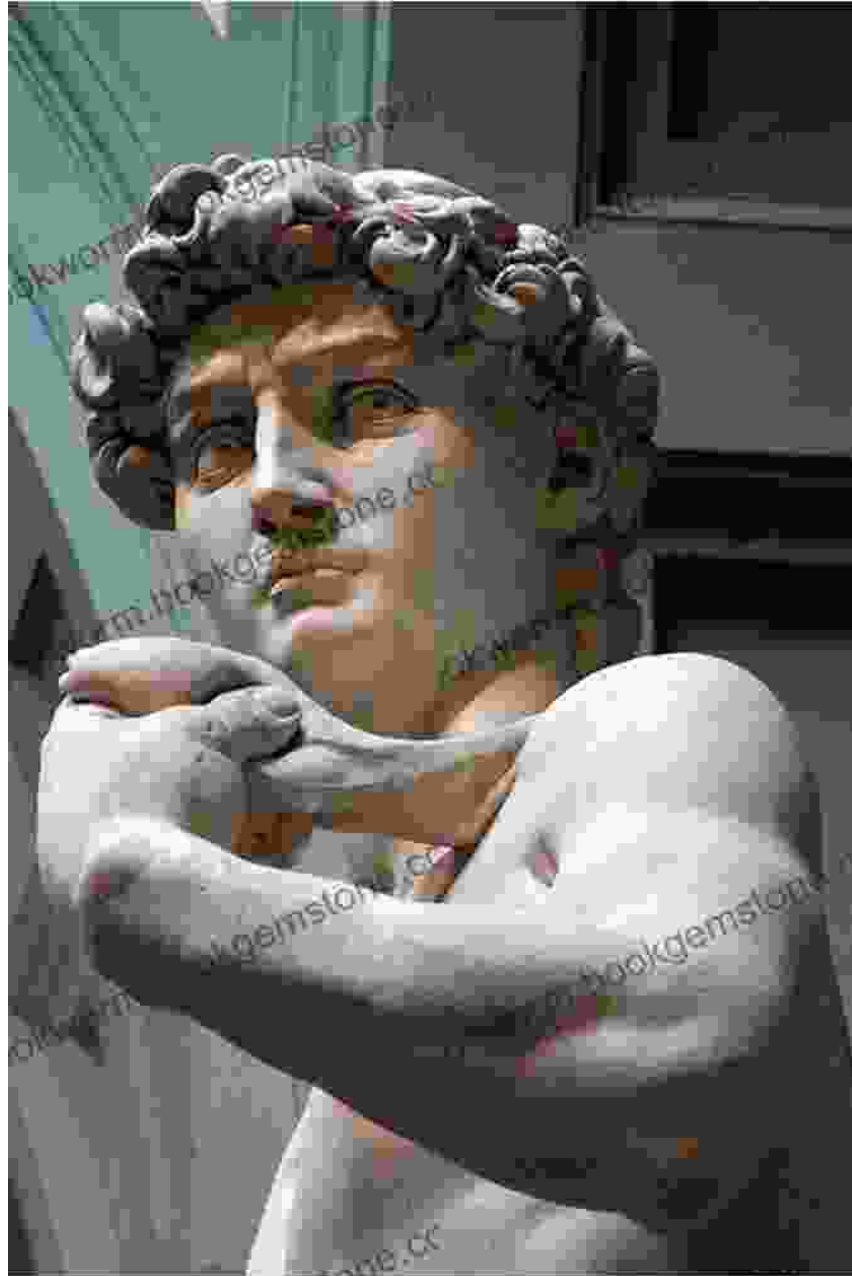

2. The David (1501-1504)

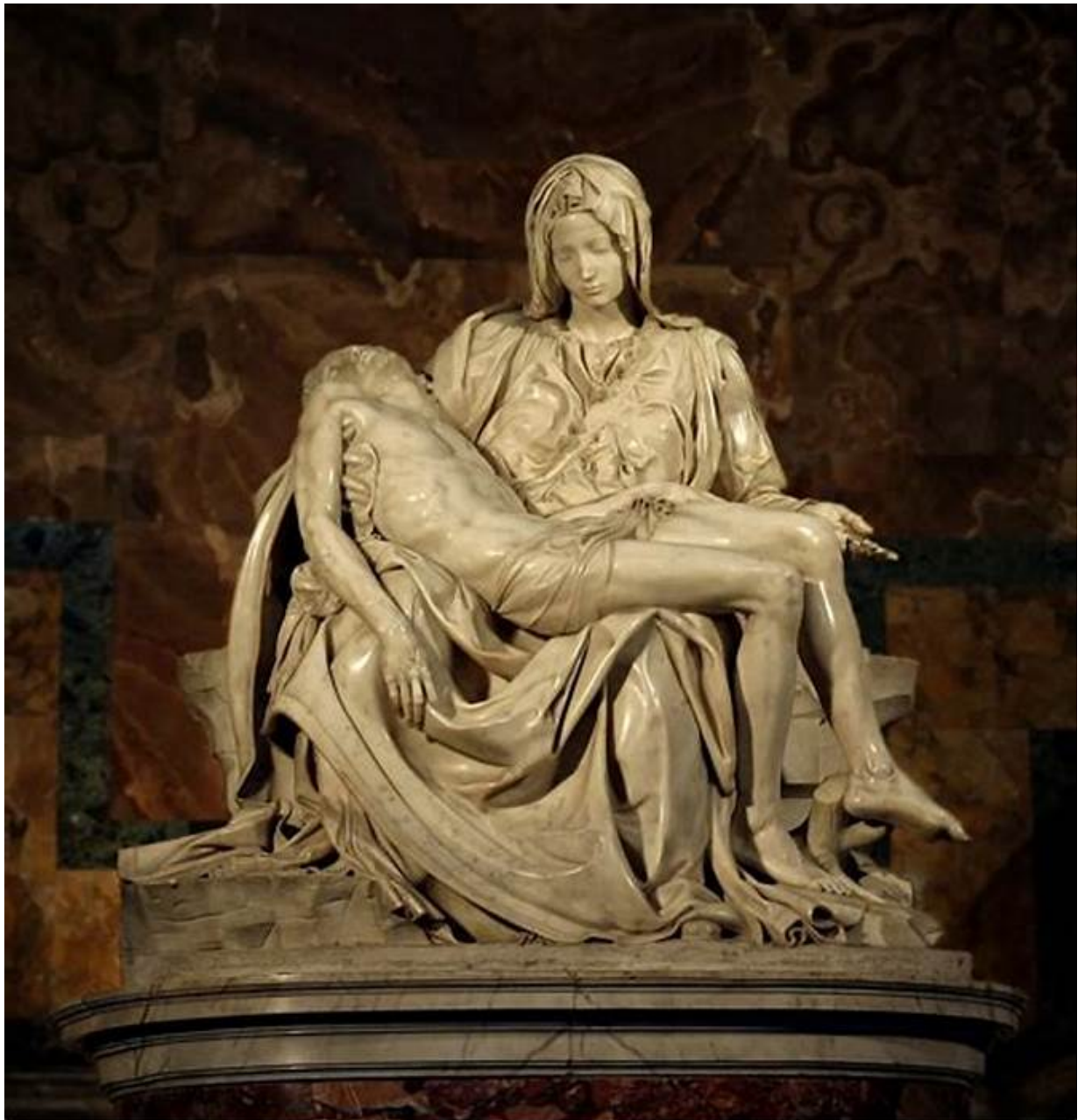
5. The Moses (1513-1515)

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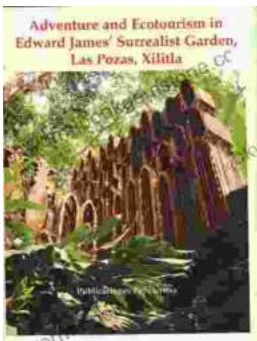
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
